# Activity 3 Assessing Movie Reviews

#### **Activity Overview**

In this activity, student pairs will conduct an unscripted *Ebert and Roeper*-style conversation about a movie in front of a "live studio audience" (their classmates).

#### **Directions**

#### **Before the Activity Begins**

Provide student pairs a few minutes to read their notes or finished reviews as preparation. Let them know that each pair will get only four minutes to debate a film. Remind students that their discussion is unscripted. Distribute the **PEEREVAL.8xv** NoteFolio<sup>™</sup> file to the students' devices. (Note: This form is also provided in paper-based format at the end of this activity.)

#### **During the Activity**

Invite student pairs to the "stage" for the conversation.

Consider creating a stage by bringing in two chairs not normally seen in your classroom and hanging some sort of banner or backdrop behind the chairs. Also, consider filming the discussions. Then plan a day for watching them and completing the NoteFolio™ Peer Evaluation Form.

If discussions are not filmed, have students complete the **Peer Evaluation Form** on the day of the discussions.

#### After the Activity

Have students turn in any **Peer Evaluation Form** files and complete a reflection on the lesson. The **Reflecting on What You've Done** form is available in the **Movies.edc** file. A paper-based copy is also included at the end of this activity.

The steps to collect files from student devices and place them on your computer are:

- 1. Attach the TI Connectivity cable to your computer and the student device.
- 2. On your computer, create a new folder to hold the student's files.
- Start the TI Connect<sup>™</sup> software.
- 4. Click on **TI Device Explorer**. This lists the files on the device.
- 5. Click on **Application Variable**. Highlight **PEEREVAL**, and drag it to the folder you created to hold the students' work on your desktop.
- 6. You can collect the **Reflecting on What You've Done** form in the same manner.

Tip: For ease of viewing, have the students rename the peer evaluation file as they are working on it to their last name, all in capital letters.
