Activity 3 Assessing Allusions

Materials

- Voyage[™] 200 Personal Learning Tool (PLT), TI-92 Plus, or TI-83 Plus
- Elements of Allusion edc resource file: Instructions, Nation, Application
- TI-GRAPH LINK[™] Cable, TI-Navigator[™], or USB Cable
- TI External Keyboard (optional)

Activity Overview

Students will read a poem and identify its uses of allusion, explaining the effect of each allusion used in short answers. Students will then offer suggestions for a similar poem, either on a topic provided or of their choice, creating allusions that would maintain a similar theme as those used in the sample poem.

Tip

This assessment activity focuses on an analysis of a poem through short answer and extends the students' options for demonstrating mastery by asking them to provide a similar sample, which involves higher-order thinking skills and full understanding of how the device affects the original poem.

Directions

Before the Activity Begins

Review lesson objectives with students.

During the Activity

Students will read the poem provided. They will identify the allusions used and each allusion's effect in short answer format by recording their answers in the

Nation file. They will then write a brief explanation of possible allusions someone could use to write a poem modeled after this one in terms of its linking personal history to world history, but with a theme other than rivers. They will record their answers in the **Application** file. Students can submit their work either by using the TI-Navigator[™], TI-GRAPH LINK[™] cable, or by using the USB cable.

Use the following instructions to access and use the **Elements of Allusion** files on devices. The action steps are the actions students need to perform to obtain the files and use the exercises on their devices. Additional information for the teacher appears in shaded boxes.


3. Press F4 Next to access the Nations file.

When the students have read the poem and are ready to write their responses, they should press ENTER to place the cursor in the response box.

4. Press F4: Next to access the Application file and complete the assessment.

<u>TI-83 Plus</u>

 If necessary, exit the previous file by pressing Menu (using the Y= key) and then select 3:> Item List to redisplay the section listing. Use ▲ ▼ to highlight the second Instructions file.

- 2. Press ENTER. The directions for completing the assessment are presented. Use to scroll through the text.
- 3. Press NEXT (the GRAPH key) to access the Nations file.

When the students have read the poem and are ready to write their responses, they should press >**ANS** (the <u>WINDOW</u> key) to place the cursor in the response box.

4. Press **NEXT** (the <u>GRAPH</u> key) to access the **Application** file and complete the assessment. Be sure the device is in Alpha mode (<u>2nd</u> <u>ALPHA</u>.)
