Activity Overview

In this activity, students present their monologues to the class. Students in the audience will make inferences and attempt to determine which work of art the speaker is personifying.

Directions

Before the Activity Begins

Review the basics of public speaking (transparency) as well as the rubric you will be using to assess the monologues.


Remind students that they will be participating in a guessing game. They must listen closely to each student's monologue for clues. Advise students to hold their guesses until the speaker has completed their presentation.

Using the following instructions, each student should open his/her file (possibly ARTPRA) created in Activity 2 prior to approaching the podium.

Turn on the handheld and press APPS to display the list of installed applications.
 Using , highlight NoteFlio from the application list.




 Press ENTER twice to clear the NoteFolio™ introduction screen and display a new (blank) NoteFolio™ file.



To display all the NoteFolio™ files on your handheld, select Menu (press GRAPH), use
 To highlight Open, and press ENTER.





During the Activity

Have students write their names on small pieces of scrap paper and place the names in a box or hat. Draw a name to determine who begins presenting their monologue.

A sample rubric for assessing the monologue is included, both in paper-based and electronic formats. You can use these for yourself or allow the students to evaluate their peers' performances.

After the Activity

Ask students to anonymously vote for their favorite monologue. Present the winner with a souvenir from the museum.

Tips on Public Speaking

Tips for the Speaker

Greet your audience and state your name.

Speak loudly and clearly.

Maintain eye contact with your audience.

Say, "Thank you," to signal that you are done. Wait for applause before walking away from the podium.

Smile!

Tips for the Audience

Ensure that all distractions are put away.

Show your respect for the speaker by being courteously quiet.

Applaud when the speaker has completed his or her presentation.
