# Activity Overview

Each student will present his or her predictions to the class, using the project display board as part of the presentation. In addition, each student will submit to the teacher his or her own reflective essay on predictions and their outcomes.

Give each student a choice: read the reflective essay as a speech to the class (some students feel more comfortable reading a scripted speech) or speak extemporaneously, taking cues from the project display board.

# Tip

Because it is likely that this activity will span the school year, you may want to pick a day in April, May or June (when summer movie sequels are looming) when the students will present their project display boards.

#### **Directions**

### **Before the Activity Begins**

Review the basics of public speaking the day before the presentations. See the teacher transparency titled **Public Speaking Tips**. Send the students the

#### **During the Activity**

Each student will present his or her predictions to the class with a project display board. Have each student evaluate three other students' presentations.

#### After the Activity

Students will turn in completed **Peer Evaluation Forms** (either electronically or on paper, as per the teacher's instructions).

## **Public Speaking Tips**

#### Tips for the Speaker

- Greet your audience and state your name.
- ♦ Speak loudly and clearly.
- Maintain eye contact with your audience.
- ◆ Say, "Thank you," to signal that you are done. Wait for applause before walking away from the podium.
- ♦ Smile!

#### Tips for the Audience

- ♦ Be sure all distractions are put away.
- Show your respect for the speaker by being courteously quiet.
- ♦ Clap when the person is done.
